SHORT CV OF THE SUPERVISOR

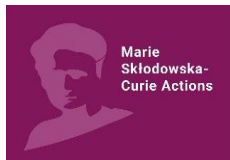
My research work combines Intellectual History, Social History and Political Economy. My PhD dissertation addressed the economic transformations that took place in Portugal during the Carnation Revolution (1974-75), focusing on the nationalization of the bank system. During my Post-Doc I worked on the period between 1976 and 1989, in order to understand the trajectory of the Portuguese economy since the revolutionary period until the second constitutional revision. My research evolved from an analysis of the impact of Neoliberalism in Portugal, to a comparative study of the Southern European Semiperiphery (Portugal, Spain and Greece) between the 1970s and the creation of the European Monetary Union. I have recently started a research project on economic planning in Portugal, between 1945 and 1980, focused on the global circulation of knowledge and technology. I am the author of several articles, book chapters and books, as well as editor of two collective volumes. Besides teaching courses on Twentieth-century History, and supervising several MA dissertations, I have been scientific referee for several journals (Ler História, Portuguese Journal of Social Sciences, Análise Social, International Journal of Labour and Working-Class History) and publishers (Manchester University Press or Routledge). Between 2020 and 2022, I acted as chair of the research group 'Economia e Sociedade' within the Instituto de História Contemporânea, to which I am affiliated since 2006. I am currently Editorial Director of Edições Tigre de Papel (<https://tigrepapel.pt/edicoes-tigre-de-papel/>).
